

Bank branch reductions offer opportunities for new technologies

Reduction of physical banking branches have been making headlines in recent weeks. It started with RBS announcing the closure of 54 branches on top of plans to close 162 branches earlier this year. The European Banking Federation have also announced its not just the United Kingdom showing an increase in bank closures, its Europe wide. Spain is top of the leader board with 18,000 branches closed in the past ten years and a 21% fall in branches across Europe in the last decade.

The increase in bank closures is having a knock on effect with the public's access to cash. Link, the UK's payment systems regulator, is working closely with banks to get their commitment for improvements to ensure people still have access to cash and banking systems via ATMs on the high street.
